## Paris 2024: Egypt's Paralympic Stars Strike Gold and Beyond

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## President Al-Sisi Applauds Egypt's Paralympic Heroes for their Remarkable Achievements

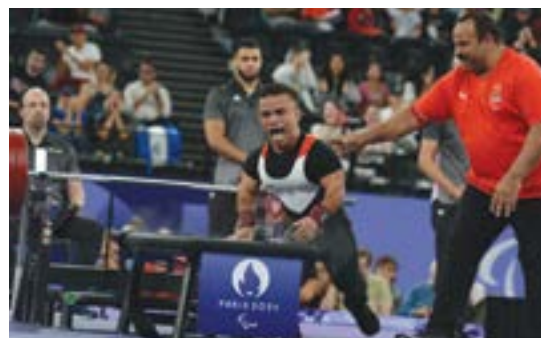
*The Egyptian athletes secured seven medals: two gold, two silver, and three bronze, finishing 41st in the overall ranking. This marks a significant improvement over the previous edition in Tokyo 2020, where Egypt ranked 64th with seven medals (five silver and two bronze).*

## Equal Rewards for Olympic and Paralympic Champions in Egypt

During a cabinet meeting held at the government headquarters, Minister Ashraf Sobhy declared to Egypt's Prime Minister, Dr. Mostafa Madbouli, that the state treats all Egyptian athletes equally, noting that the rewards for Paralympic and Olympic champions are the same. Gold medalists, whether Olympic or Paralympic, will receive 4 million Egyptian pounds, silver medalists will be awarded 3 million, and bronze medalists 2 million.

"There is no difference in the rewards for Paralympic and Olympic champions," Sobhy reiterated.

Egypt secured a total of 7 medals at the Paris Paralympic Games (2 gold, 2 silver, and 3 bronze), while Egyptian athletes won 3 medals at the Olympic Games (1 gold, 1 silver, and 1 bronze).



### Dr. Ashraf Sobhy: "Egypt's Paralympic Achievements in Paris Highlight Equal Recognition and Support for Athletes"

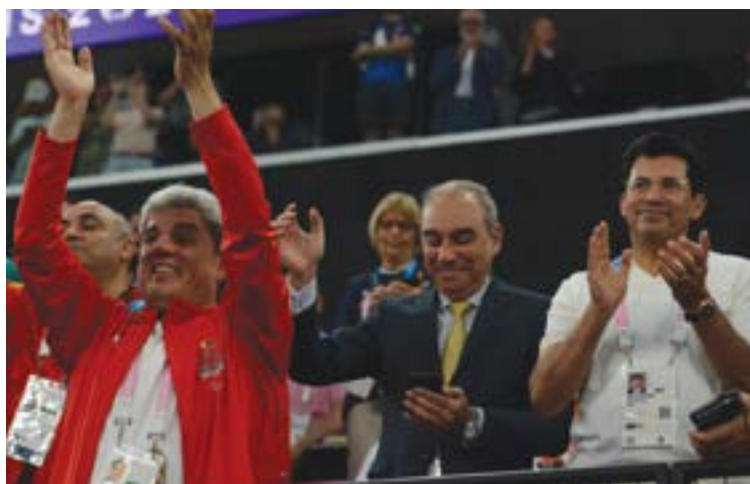


Dr. Ashraf Sobhy, Egypt's Minister of Youth and Sports, expressed immense pride in the exceptional achievement of the Egyptian delegation at the Paris 2024 Paralympic Games, commending the determination of the Egyptian athletes who lived up to their mission and raised the Egyptian flag high. Sobhy noted that the Egyptian state attaches great importance to Paralympic sports and

Furthermore, he highlighted the Ministry's substantial efforts to improve Egypt's sports infrastructure according to world-class standards, giving Egyptian athletes the opportunity to compete at the highest levels.



### Mustafa Applauds Egypt's Medal Surge at Paris 2024 Paralympics

Dr. Hossameldin Mustafa, President of the Egyptian Paralympic Committee, has expressed his deep gratitude to Egyptian President Abdel Fattah El-Sisi, Minister of Youth and Sports Dr. Ashraf Sobhy, and Egypt's Paralympic athletes for their outstanding achievements at the Paris 2024 Paralympic Games. The Egyptian delegation's performance was a source of pride for the nation, as they secured seven medals, including two golds, a significant improvement compared to previous Games.

Dr. Mustafa emphasized that Egypt's results in Paris marked a historic shift. The Egyptian delegation ranked 41st in the overall standings, a substantial leap from their 64th place finish at the Tokyo 2020 Paralympics. "This is a clear testament to the progress we've made in supporting our athletes and improving our infrastructure," said Dr. Mustafa.

He also highlighted the inclusion of 17 female athletes in the Egyptian delegation, stressing the importance of gender representation in sports. Remarkably, one-third of the Egyptian athletes who participated in Paris brought home medals, an unprecedented accomplishment in the country's Paralympic history.

One of the standout moments was Nadia Fekry's achievement, as she became the first Egyptian woman to win a Paralympic medal at the age of 50, a milestone for the nation and an inspiring feat that speaks to the resilience and determination of Egypt's Para athletes.

Looking ahead, Dr. Mustafa outlined the committee's plans to begin preparations for the Los Angeles 2028 Paralympic Games immediately. He revealed that new training centers will be established across various sports, distributed throughout Egypt's governorates, to ensure that athletes have access to top-level facilities and training. "Our focus will be on building a solid foundation that allows our athletes to perform even better on the global stage in the coming years," he added.



# Rehab Radwan: Egypt's Golden Paralympic Champion in Powerlifting



By winning the gold medal in Para Powerlifting at Paris 2024 Paralympic Games, Egyptian champion Rehab Radwan solidified her previous achievements as a world champion in the 55 kg weight category. Radwan successfully lifted 117 kg on her first attempt, followed by 121 kg on her second. Though she was unable to lift 122 kg on her third attempt, she still claimed the gold medal.

With this victory, Rehab Radwan brought home Egypt's second gold medal in Para Powerlifting, following the earlier gold won by Mohamed El-Menyawi in the same sport.

Rehab was seen as one of the top contenders for a medal in Para Powerlifting and was also chosen by the Egyptian Paralympic Committee to carry Egypt's flag at the opening ceremony, alongside rower Ali El-Zeini.

Our champion Rehab, endowed with an iron will, chose to face challenges head-on with perseverance. Though she was affected by polio as a baby, this did not stop her from achieving her dreams and accomplishing extraordinary feats.

Rehab Radwan's sporting career is marked by numerous successes. She won a silver medal at the Rio 2016 Paralympic Games, another

silver at the Tokyo 2020 Games, and multiple gold medals at the Para Powerlifting World Championships: in Dubai (2023), Georgia (2021), Kazakhstan (2019), and Mexico (2017).

In addition to her Olympic titles, Radwan claimed two gold medals at the World Cup held in Cairo and Georgia in June 2024. She also set a new world record, lifting 135 kg, surpassing the previous record by 2 kg, which had been set by her Japanese competitor at the Dubai edition in February 2023.

Rehab has twice been awarded the First Class Sports Merit Award by President Abdel Fattah El-Sissi, in 2016 and 2017.

Today, the Egyptian champion fulfilled her dream of raising the Egyptian flag in Paris, hearing the Egyptian national anthem, and gifting Egyptian spectators their second Paralympic gold medal. Following her remarkable achievement in Paris, Rehab expressed her gratitude for the tremendous effort made by the technical staff in developing the level of Egypt's para powerlifters.

The Egyptian champion also extended her thanks to Dr. Hossameldin Mostafa, President of the Egyptian Paralympic Committee, and Emad Ramadan, the committee's treasurer, for their unwavering support of the national team.



## El-Menawy's Gold : A Remarkable 'Mission Impossible' Accomplished

Winning a gold medal in your first appearance at a major event like the Paralympic Games is no easy feat. In fact, it's often seen as an incredibly difficult, if not impossible, mission. However, this was not the case for Egyptian Paralympic weightlifter Mohamed El-Menawy, who accomplished the remarkable achievement of claiming gold in the 59 kg category after a fierce competition with China's Qi Yongkai. El-Menawy successfully lifted 201 kg, surpassing his rival by just one kilogram.

"The competition was intense, but we have top-level coaches who helped me approach the event with confidence and without fear," said Mohamed El-Menawy, who took home gold in the first-ever Paralympic appearance for athletes with short stature.

"Competing for the first time in such a major event as the Paralympics places a lot of pressure on the athlete, especially due to a lack of experience in events of this magnitude. But I was confident I could achieve something great, and I managed to fulfill my mission," he added.

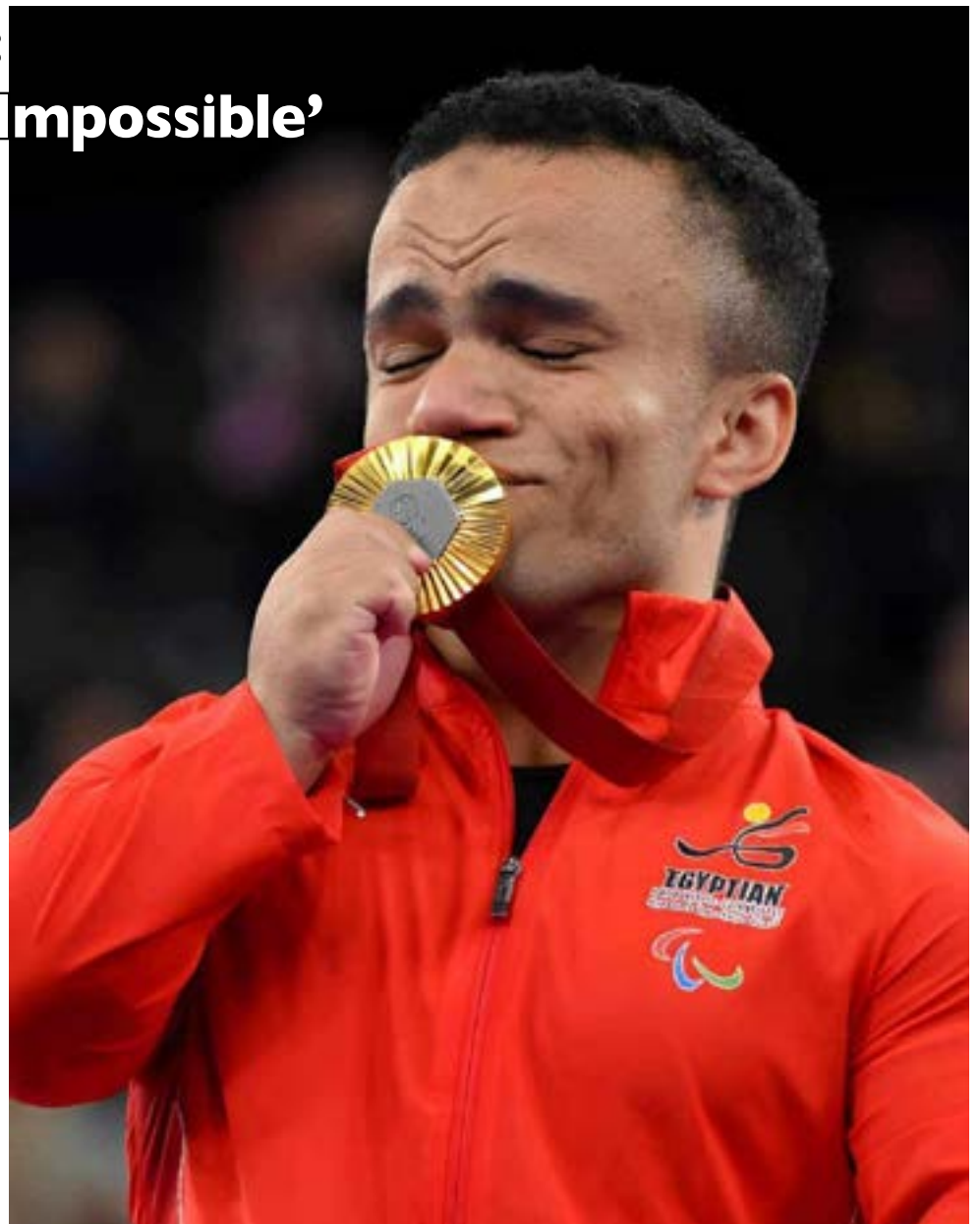
This gold medal held special significance not only for El-Menawy but for the entire Egyptian delegation, as it was Egypt's first medal at the Paris Paralympics. After eight days without any medals, the Egyptians had to wait until the 9th day to finally open their tally.

El-Menawy's gold medal restored faith and brought a sense of joy, serving as a powerful consolation for the nation.

The Egyptian champion fondly recalls the moment when he heard the Egyptian national anthem during the medal ceremony. "My biggest dream was to see the Egyptian flag on the podium, and thanks to God, I was able to make that dream come true," said El-Menawy, who expressed his gratitude to everyone who helped him achieve his success.

Indeed, Mohamed El-Menawy is a world-class athlete. Before his triumph in Paris, he had already achieved numerous successes, including a silver medal at the World Cup in Georgia, which earned him qualification for Paris. He also claimed three bronze medals at the World Championships in Dubai in 2023.

This impressive track record reveals that El-Menawy is a promising force in the future of Egyptian Para Powerlifting.



## Fatma Mahrous Fulfills Her Dream



In 2021, Egyptian Para Powerlifter Fatma Mahrous narrowly missed a Paralympic medal, finishing fourth at the Tokyo Games. Despite the disappointment, Mahrous remained determined to achieve her dream of winning a Paralympic medal.

Three years later, she accomplished her mission, claiming the silver medal in the 67 kg category in Paris. She lifted 139 kg, just behind China's Tan Yujiao, who lifted 142 kg. A two-time world champion

in 2017 and 2019, Mahrous's success in Paris was no surprise—it was anticipated. After her setback in Tokyo, she rebounded by winning silver at the 2023 World Championships in Dubai and then gold at the World Cup in Cairo later that year. Before heading to Paris, Mahrous also secured gold at the World Cup in Sharm El-Sheikh and silver in Georgia, finally capping her rich career with the much-coveted Paralympic medal.



## Sobhi Honors His Mother's Prediction with Silver



A few months before the Paralympic Games, Egyptian Para Powerlifter Mohamed Sobhi's mother predicted that her son would win a medal in Paris. "One evening during Ramadan, my mother insisted I would stand on the podium in Paris," Sobhi recalled. Her words inspired and motivated him, giving him confidence in his ability to succeed.

Sobhi fulfilled his mother's prophecy, winning silver in the 88 kg category with a lift of 230 kg, just 12 kg short of gold medalist Yan Panpan from China. A seasoned competitor, Sobhi's Paralympic journey began in 2008 in Beijing, where he finished fourth. He won his first medal, a silver, at the London 2012 Games. At the Tokyo 2020 Paralympics, the 45-year-old earned a bronze medal, and in Paris, he added another silver to his collection, bringing his Paralympic medal tally to three.

Although he doesn't hold world championship medals, Sobhi has claimed two golds at the World Cups in Cairo (2023) and Sharm El-Sheikh (2024).

"I am very thankful for the silver medal and I will continue to compete till I collect the gold. This is my dream and I will go after it whatever it takes me to do," expressed Sobhi.



## Safaa Hassan's Poignant Triumph



Tears streamed down her face as Safaa Hassan clutched her bronze medal at Paris 2024 Paralympics, a testament to the tireless dedication and perseverance that brought her to this defining moment. "I worked so hard to achieve this," said the Egyptian Para Powerlifter after securing third place in the 79 kg category with an impressive lift of 139 kg. For Hassan, participating in her first Paralympic Games, the victory was monumental. "I was scared before the competition, but I trusted that God would reward my efforts," she said with quiet determination.

Hassan's international career began in 2021, where she placed 5th at the World Championships in Georgia. By 2023, her rise continued with a 7th-place finish at the World Championships in Dubai, followed by a gold medal at the Cairo World Cup. Heading into the Paris Paralympics, she had already earned two bronze medals at the Sharm El-Sheikh and Georgia World Cups. Safaa views her success in Paris not as the culmination of her journey but as the beginning, promising even greater achievements in the future.



## Nadia Fekry: Defying Time to Make History



For Nadia Fekry, age is merely a number. At 50 years old, the seasoned Egyptian Para Powerlifter continues to defy expectations, ascending the Paralympic podium for the fourth time in her illustrious career. She captured bronze in the 86 kg category at the Paris 2024 Paralympics, lifting 145 kg and reaffirming her place among the sport's elite.

This medal marks her first since claiming bronze at the Beijing 2008 Paralympics, 16

years ago. Returning to the Paralympic podium after such a lengthy interval is no small feat and speaks volumes about Fekry's unwavering determination and relentless spirit. Her Paralympic journey began with a bronze in Sydney 2000, followed by a silver in Athens 2004, but her accolades extend far beyond the Games. In 2013, she took silver at the World Championships in Dubai, later placing 5th in both the 2019 and 2021 World Championships.

In 2023, she staged a remarkable comeback, winning gold at the Dubai World Championships and the Cairo World Cup. This momentum carried into 2024, where she added silver at the Sharm El-Sheikh World Cup, capping the year with her triumphant bronze in Paris.



## Egypt's Sitting Volleyball Team Secures a Hard-Earned Bronze

In a display of grit and resilience, Egypt's sitting volleyball team clinched a prized bronze medal at Paris 2024 Paralympics, defeating Germany in a gripping match that went to four sets. The Egyptian team, with its impressive performance throughout the tournament, qualified for the semi-finals after two victories in the group stage but fell short against Iran. Undeterred, they rallied in the bronze medal match, leaving Paris with their heads held high and a place on the podium.

## Discussions on the table



**I**n a brief 36-hour visit to the Egyptian delegation participating in the Paris 2024 Paralympic Games, Egypt's Minister of Youth and Sports, Dr. Ashraf Sobhy, held a meeting with Mr. Andrew Parsons, President of the International Paralympic Committee (IPC). During their conversation, Dr. Sobhy congratulated Mr. Parsons on the successful organization of the Paris 2024 Paralympic Games.

Dr. Sobhy highlighted how much Egypt has evolved since 2006. "Egypt has seen considerable development over the years," he said. Parsons acknowledged this and pointed to the country's progress as the reason why Egypt was chosen to host the prestigious VISTA Conference in 2025, which had been postponed from 2023 due to political issues. "For us, Egypt is a nation in development, with strong grassroots and high-performance programs. We recognize the significant support your government provides, and for that, we thank you, Minister."

Dr. Sobhy then emphasized the strides Egypt has made under the leadership of President Abdel Fattah El-Sisi, particularly since 2014 when the "New Republic" was established. "We have launched numerous initiatives, including ensuring equal treatment for both able-bodied and para-athletes. This includes equal bonuses, grants, training camps, plans, prize money, and coaching staff. One of our most notable achievements is the construction of one of the largest Olympic villages in Africa and the Middle East, located in the New Administrative Capital. Spanning 5 million square

meters, this village contains all the essential facilities to host major sporting events."

Dr. Sobhy further highlighted Egypt's ability to host large-scale events, referencing the country's successful management of the World Handball Championship during the COVID-19 pandemic. "We pioneered the 'four bubbles' technique to ensure safety, which convinced the world to participate. This, in turn, helped Tokyo implement similar protocols for the 2021 postponed Olympic and Paralympic Games. Egypt is always ready to rise to the challenge of hosting major events."

Sobhy went on to detail how, since 2018, Egypt has focused on becoming a hub for international sporting events. "We have succeeded in this ambition. Since then,



we have organized and hosted over 400 official events, which has also propelled Egyptian experts to serve on the boards of numerous international sports federations."

Dr. Sobhy expressed his eagerness to collaborate with Mr. Parsons in both his IOC and IPC roles, saying, "We have several projects with the EPC, and we would like to continue working together to establish an African training hub in Egypt to benefit the entire continent."

"As a professor of sports sciences myself," he added, "I fully support the VISTA Conference, and I would like to be involved. We could also organize it alongside our Egyptian Sports Expo, focusing on media and Para sports."

Dr. Hossameldin Mustafa, President of the EPC, echoed these sentiments, stating his desire to continue working with the IPC on organizational development programs. "We aim to position Egypt as a model for all African countries to follow. We have comprehensive support from our minister, our government, and across all aspects—financial, administrative, and logistical."

Mr. Parsons reaffirmed his commitment to supporting the EPC and Egypt's efforts to host the 2027 Para African Games. He acknowledged the right people, expertise, and world-class facilities Egypt possesses, adding, "We need strong leadership in Africa, and for me, that country is Egypt. You have the potential to lead the continent forward, and we are here to fully support you."

In conclusion, Dr. Sobhy stated, "We are keen to sign a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the IPC. Egypt is ready to lead Africa."

## Shared discussions and thoughts in Paris



**I**n a pivotal meeting held in Paris, Dr. Hossam Eldin Mustafa, President of the Egyptian Paralympic Committee (EPC), and Andrew Parsons, President of the International Paralympic Committee (IPC), shared their thoughts on the future of Paralympic sports, the ongoing Paris 2024 Paralympic Games, and Egypt's expanding role in the Paralympic movement across Africa.

Dr. Hossam Eldin Mustafa emphasized the introduction of new talent in Egypt's Paralympic delegation, with nearly 40% of the athletes being fresh faces. "We have reshuffled almost all national teams across various sports to qualify new elements capable of competing not only in Paris 2024 but also in the Los Angeles 2028 Paralympic Games," he explained. He also highlighted the delegation's gender diversity, consisting of 18 female and 36 male athletes, marking a significant step towards gender equality. "Our focus is not just on winning medals; we are preparing these young athletes for the future," he added.

Andrew Parsons acknowledged Egypt's strong presence at the Games, noting the visibility of Egyptian athletes across various sports. "Everywhere I go, I see the red-colored outfits that reflect the Egyptian flag," Parsons remarked. "It's impressive to see Egypt participating in so many sports, which is a clear indication of growth. It's great to have you back at the helm, Dr. Hossam Eldin Mustafa."

Dr. Mustafa outlined Egypt's ambitious plans to bid for the 2036 or 2040 Olympics and Paralympics, leveraging the advanced infrastructure of the new Egyptian Olympic City in the New Administrative Capital. This city, fully equipped to host large international events, will host the

Para Swimming Series this December and the World Powerlifting Championship in 2025. "We have already secured agreements to host the Para Swimming Series annually until 2027," Mustafa noted.

Mustafa expressed gratitude for the Egyptian government's support, particularly from the Ministry of Youth and Sports, led by Dr. Ashraf Sobhy. This support has been instrumental in attracting sponsors, with Egypt securing nine sponsors for the Paris 2024 Games—a record number for the country. Looking ahead, the EPC plans to launch a social media campaign to attract additional sponsors, aiming to reduce reliance on government funding.

Mustafa also spoke about the EPC's efforts to develop various sports and its collaboration with NGOs to enhance the social impact of the Paralympic movement. Parsons agreed on the importance of intertwining sports with entertainment to advance the movement's future. Additionally, Mustafa announced Egypt's intention to bid for hosting the World Para Powerlifting headquarters, a move Parsons enthusiastically supported, recognizing Egypt's potential to pioneer international federations in Africa.

As the meeting concluded, it became evident that Egypt is set to play a leading role in the future of Paralympic sports, not just within its borders but across the African continent. With strong governmental support, a focus on scientific development, and ambitious plans for the future, Egypt is poised to become a central hub for Paralympic excellence.
